

## Isaac Lovell and Mary Ann Lovell

On the 1<sup>st</sup> October 1843 Isaac Lovell married Mary Lovell in St Andrew's Church, Cotterstock. Isaac was born in Glapthorn and gave his occupation as a labourer.

This Marriage was solemnized between us, Isaac Lovell and Mary Anne Lovell's & next in the Presence of us, Wm Berridge and J. J. Land

Isaac and Mary lived in The Old Post House; the census of 1861 lists Isaac as a shepherd and Mary Ann as a shepherd's wife and laundress.



They had a daughter Elizabeth, born in 1848; she appears in the census of 1861 but not in 1871.

It is likely that the Elizabeth Lovell referred to in the Peterborough Advertiser in 1862 is their unfortunate daughter. The Advertiser states:

### OUNDLÉ

**ACCIDENT FROM FIRE** – On the 4<sup>th</sup> instant an accident occurred to Elizabeth Lovell, a girl 14 years of age, living in Cotterstock. The child went from her home the house of a neighbour, and while she was lighting a candle with a piece of paper, a portion of the lighted paper fell upon her pinafore, which ignited and the flame rapidly spread. She ran to another house, but the occupier being from home, she ran to the shop of Mr. Berridge, who wrapped a coat around her and smothered the flames. The injuries received by the unfortunate girl are of a very serious, and she now lies in a precarious state under medical treatment. Mr Berridge's hand was severely burnt.

A later edition of the paper stated:

**DEATH FROM FIRE** - The injured person lingered until the 20<sup>th</sup> inst., when she expired, the injuries she sustained leading to lockjaw.

Isaac and Mary Ann had other children who, sadly, died very young. In 1843 Emma died aged 1 month, in 1846 James died aged 17 weeks, in 1852 James died aged 8 months and in 1858 Anna died as an infant.

They had a daughter Mary Ann who was born in 1853, she survived and lived to 72 years of age. Isaac died aged 53 in 1874 and he is buried in St Andrew's, his gravestone is broken now as is his daughter Mary Ann's but they are at rest next to each other.
